**JUNE 19, 2017 PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Matt McIntyre called the meeting to order at 6:15 p.m. Committee members present were Matt McIntyre, and Paul Davis. Jonathon Frey was absent. Also present were Police Chief Tom Klubertanz, City Administrator Ramona Flanigan, Mayor Chris Lund, Alderperson Mark Wellnitz, Public Works Director Tom Hartzell, and a representative from the Edgerton Reporter.

Klubertanz confirmed the agendas were properly posted on Friday, June 16, 2017 at the Post Office, Edgerton Library and City Hall.

APPROVAL OF PUBLIC SAFETY MINUTES:

A Davis/McIntyre motion to approve the May 1, 2017 Public Safety Committee meeting minutes passed, all voted in favor.

DISCUSS GENERATOR FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT:

Klubertanz stated that the Police department is in need of a full generator. He stated that it would not be beneficial to purchase a partial generator that would only allow the lights to stay on. They would need a full generator in order to keep the department fully functioning.

A Davis/McIntyre motion to pursue the discussion of a full generator at the next Finance meeting passed on a 2/0 roll call vote.

POLICE CHIEF REPORT:

Chief Klubertanz reviewed the service call numbers that were provided in the packet.

Klubertanz also stated that the Annual Awards dinner was held and those awarded were; Lieutenant Vierck, Officer Kanable, and Meagan Farrell.

Being no other business before the Public Safety Committee, a McIntyre/Davis motion to adjourn passed, all voted in favor.

Attached you will find the total Calls for Service for the month of June/July. These are pretty steady through the year across the board as of this time, with a total of 2301 calls for June/July.

SIU continues it work with Officers from the Department. June there were 40 hours scheduled for work with this unit. In July there was a cutback due to staffing issues.

Spillman, the law enforcement records system continues to be a work in progress. Updates were recently conducted. A move from UCR reporting to IBR reporting is underway and should be completed this year. Training on this will begin in September.

911 Center is completing its back-up radio upgrades. This will be put into effect at a future date. All Edgerton PD radios will need to be reprogrammed to include these channels for 2018 Budget.

Employee performance evaluations continue. These have proven to be a useful tool since its implementation in 2014.

The department is working with an Intern, through Blackhawk Technical College. He is about half way through the required 200 HRS. This will be completed by the end of August.

Tobacco Days was completed without any concerns at the Park, or from incidents downtown stemming from the park. The crowd at the Park was reported to be down from previous years. Parking is still a complaint heard from festival goers. Also steps put into place to eliminate parking did not deter vehicles from parking on ball field side of roadway.

Drug Interdiction deployment was successful. Several more of these deployments will be scheduled. Recently a second interdiction was conducted in Evansville. Numbers have not been received as of this time.

National Night Out will be Aug 1st at Racetrack Park.

Court disposition was completed involving drug arrests that occurred 2016. With this disposition, a vehicle taken into evidence in this case, has been forfeited by Court Order. Its future is being evaluated.


Officer's Corner


Crime Prevention

A preventable crime that affects the entire community is Impaired Driving. Impaired Driving can be defined as driving under the influence of alcohol, drugs, or a combination of both. When individuals consume alcohol and/or drugs they affect their ability to safely drive and their ability to make sound decisions. This leads to poor choices and can lead to heartbreak and despair when someone is injured or killed by an impaired driver.

Victims of impaired driving crashes can range from a family going to dinner, a school bus transporting children, to anyone driving to or from work. This means anyone in the community, at anytime, could find themselves as a victim of an impaired driver. A google search of drunken driving crashes yields too many results to recount. This is a very serious problem that must be addressed by community collaboration to prevent tragedy.

The best prevention method for impaired driving is deterrence. Deterrence is achieved by decreasing the social acceptance of binge drinking and impaired driving, the likelihood of getting arrested for impaired driving, and increased penalties for impaired driving offenses. Healthy Edgerton, the school district, the hospital, and the police department have been working together for years to increase deterrence. This has proven effective in reduced number of crashes and reduced number of underage children admitting to drinking (reduced social acceptance of illegal alcohol consumption).

Community members can encourage friends and family to make responsible choices, have a designated driver, let others know that we, as a community, do not tolerate impaired driving, and contact the police department if you suspect someone is driving while impaired. As with many crimes, the police department relies heavily on the community to assist us with extra eyes and ears watching for and reporting crime.



Chief's News

A growing problem all over the country that does not discriminate between towns big or small is the opiate drug epidemic. This includes prescription pain killers, heroin, and more recently fentanyl and carfentanil.

Opiate addiction grips victims and turns their life upside down leaving them in a daily search for their next fix. The problems caused by opiate addiction include overdoses, deaths, thefts, burglaries, and robberies.

While we do not see the same numbers as larger cities, we still are affected in Edgerton. A community collaboration to curb this epidemic is the only way to fight the opiate problem.

Edgerton Police Department Drug Interdiction Deployment

On June 29, 2017, The Edgerton Police Department coordinated a 4 hour domestic highway enforcement deployment that was focused in the City of Edgerton. The focus of this deployment was to suppress violence by interrupting drug trafficking and other criminal activity associated with these types of crimes.

The Edgerton Police Department was joined in this initiative by officers from the Rock County Sheriff's Office Special Investigations Unit (SIU), Janesville PD Canine, Rock County Sheriff's Office Canine, Evansville PD, and patrol officers from the Edgerton Police Department.

These officers were able to make 17 citizen contacts. These contacts resulted in two drug arrests, five traffic citations, and 13 warnings.
